The much-delayed appeal hearing for these applications had been due to start on 11 June 2024, but shortly before that we were notified that they had been delayed yet again.

Jubilee Field

Pond. Following the felling of the three large poplars, a line of new hedging has been planted alongside Upper Common Lane. At the Annual Assembly we discussed what to do with the rest of the area by the pond, which has recently been tidied up and levelled; ideas to date include it becoming a wild flower area with a willow 'arbour'. It will need some regular work to prevent the area being taken over by brambles and docks. Any further ideas would be welcomed by the Parish Council.

New Playground Equipment. After much planning and negotiation, the protective fencing around the new play equipment was removed on 25 May, just in time for the bank holiday weekend and half term.

An 'opening ceremony' was held on 11 June 2024 and we were pleased to welcome David Johnston OBE, (our MP, until the General Election was called for 4 July), Cllr Kiera Bentley (Chair of Vale of White Horse District Council), Julie Perrin (S106 Officer for VoWHDC) and a number of representatives of the Matthews family and White Horse Show Trust.

We were able to introduce David to Amy and Sarah Heyburn (see photo overleaf). David's encouraging response to Amy's letter to him, on behalf of her sister, complaining about the lack of playground facilities for disabled children, had been forwarded to the Parish Council by VWHDC and we were able to use it in the planning application they required. Amy and Sarah were invited to cut the red ribbon to open the new swings (lower left photo overleaf).



It was also a good opportunity to thank the Matthews family for the generous S106 contribution to the village which resulted from the development of the Jacksmeadow estate. Over £103,000 has been received and most of it has now been spent on many improvements to the village, principally facilities on the Jubilee Field for the children of the village. Tom Matthews (lower right photo) was invited to cut the red ribbon to open the new Space net.

We are also extremely grateful to the White Horse Show Trust for their support of this project and many others in the past.

The Flooding of Winter 2023 / 2024

Few will wish to be reminded of last winter, which was exceptionally wet by any standards, and resulted in extensive flooding in many parts of the country. However, it became clear that part of the problem in Uffington (apart from the sheer volume of water) arose from blockages in the Uffington Brook between Wharf Farm and Moor Mill Farm, which were preventing water getting away from the village as quickly as it used to. The Parish Council would like to express its gratitude publicly to Erik Penser, owner of Compton Beauchamp Estates, and to Daniel Crawford, the Estate Manager, and his staff for the work they have done to reduce the impact of future flooding between the Wharf and the railway line. As Daniel explained at the Annual Assembly, approval had to be sought from the Environment Agency for all clearance work, and as spring

progressed, huge piles of cleared timber appeared in the adjacent field, extracted from the Uffington Brook.



OCC Highways also played their part. A team spent three days in the village clearing blockages from all the major culverts and pipes. For example, when they cleared the culvert under the road at the junction of Woolstone Road and Claypit Lane, the water level dropped by nine inches; hopefully that will mean less flooding in that area in future.

It is essential that flood water can get away from the village quickly, so here are two reminders:

- 1. All landowners and riparian owners in the village are requested to ensure that water can always flow freely in all ditches and streams.
- All residents are reminded to take precautions if there is the slightest chance of your home being flooded – by definition, this cannot necessarily be anticipated. Excellent advice is given in the OCC 'Homeowners Guide to Flood Resilience' downloadable from: <u>FloodGuide ForHomeowners.pdf</u>.

The War Memorial

Sewage Pollution

The sad state of the amount of sewage pollution in the nations' waterways and beaches is well documented in the media, not least that caused by Thames Water (TW). Locally, we know that the TW monitoring device installed at the Uffington Sewage Treatment Works (STW) showed that raw sewage was discharged into the Uffington Brook for 329 hours in 2022 – a dry summer - and for 1,200 hours in 2023 – an increase of 87%. It is unusual nowadays for a rain storm NOT to trigger a discharge. In the last 18 months there has been a need for significant repair work at the Uffington STP, which included the need for all waste to be tankered to the Wantage STW for processing, throughout an 8-month period. Our village roads suffered from this frequent heavy traffic.

We have been attempting to maintain pressure on TW to improve the situation in Uffington, but the village represents a very small part of a huge problem. In this we have been assisted by the action group 'Windrush against Sewage Pollution' (WASP), who have a significant database and a wealth of experience of dealing with TW, which has helped us greatly in our approaches to TW.

A key question we have put to TW is whether our STW is of adequate capacity for the population it serves today, which we estimate at around 720 people. We have not received a clear response on this. The STW capacity has not been increased despite new developments in the village over the last 15-20 years.

TW started more work on the Uffington STW a couple of months ago. This will continue for an estimated further 10 months from now. There will be a need for further tankering of waste from the STW at some stage and we have asked that tankers be routed away from the village. We shall monitor the situation.

We are told the current work includes installation of a 7m3 balance tank to better regulate inflows, ensuring the current storm tank operates as intended. The project does NOT, however, increase the overall capacity of the plant, although we are told it should optimise the capacity and functionality of the storm tank .TW say in their most recent letter to us "The upgrade will improve [the STPW's] ability to treat the incoming volumes of sewage, reducing the need for untreated discharges in wet weather. We're also investigating the impact of groundwater on the sewer network in this area. We expect this location to meet all government targets for storm overflows by 2035-2040."

TW state that they consider any discharge of untreated sewage as unacceptable, and are working hard to make them unnecessary, but this will take time. The overflows are designed to operate automatically when the sewer network and sewage works are overwhelmed and release diluted wastewater into rivers rather than letting it back up into people's homes. It is the way the system is designed to operate; TW want to get to the point where they will never have to discharge any untreated sewage, but this will take time.

If you are concerned about the discharge of untreated sewage from the Uffington STW, and the amount of sewage pollution in the streams around Uffington, please continue to keep the pressure up on TW and lobby those in positions of responsibility.

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THOMAS HUGHES MEMORIAL HALL

Readers may be aware that since the Hall fully reopened after Covid in 2022, the Hall Management Committee has been operating with myself as both Chairman and Bookings Manager. The Committee is now very pleased to announce and to welcome Gillian Ward as our new Chair. I know Gillian will bring valuable management experience and a fresh approach to how we manage the Hall and has the full support of the rest of the Committee.

On the subject of bookings, readers will also be aware we are in the process of moving from bookings being handled by Rose in the shop, to an on-line system. Rose and Dave are planning to retire and the shop will then be under new ownership. We are very grateful for the support that Rose, and her team, have given the Hall over many years; now is the time to wish her a very happy and peaceful retirement and relieve her of the pressure of keeping our Hall users happy, while collecting their hire fees.

Before we can complete the changeover, I will be putting all existing bookings into the new on-line system and sorting out the gremlins that come with a major change in operation. Regular hirers will be informed as this takes place and I expect there will be a transition period when "issues may arise." Please bear with me. The Hallmaster software we have purchased is well established and already used successfully by other local community halls. It will be accessed through website and the familiar calendar will be replaced with one from which bookings are made. This will remove the issue with our current system, in which the online calendar is always "chasing" the bookings in the shop diary. The Hall website is <u>www.thmh.co.uk</u> but please don't try and use it to make a booking until we have confirmed the new system is fully operational! Users will be kept fully informed as we progress. As Bookings Manager, I will be contactable by email, geoff.rumble@btinternet.com, phone 07747 846197 or knock on the door.

Following our Spring report in the Courier, the Audio-Visual system in the small hall is now fully operational. This means, that both halls now have a wide suite of audio-visual systems, including TV and an excellent Wi-Fi signal as a result of the installation of a full fibre link, courtesy of Oxfordshire County Council. Full details of our facilities can be found on the website and I can offer advice and information to potential hirers and arrange a simple teach-in. It is not complicated but mis-use of the systems can result in problems for the next user. There is no extra hire charge for the equipment.

The Hall Management Committee remains a small group with a vacancy for someone to help with our promotion and advertising, to ensure best use is made of Facebook, and the Courier etc. Additionally, as we now have the equipment, we would like to find a volunteer to set up and manage a film club. There are existing clubs in Faringdon Corn Exchange, Letcombe Regis and Longworth Village Halls who could provide advice and support.

Looking to the future, a reminder the building will close for a week starting 19th August for a new floor surface to be laid in the lobby and downstairs storage area.
